Districting Process

| | Two Initial Hearings June 25 & July 9 | Held prior to release of draft maps. Education and to solicit input on the communities in the District. Hearings must be within 30 days of each other | | | |
| | Release draft maps | Maps must be posted at least 7 days prior to 3 rd hearing. | | | |
| | Two Hearings on Draft Maps Aug 13 & Sept 9 | Two meetings to discuss and revise the draft maps and to discuss the election sequencing. Hearings must be within 45 days of each other | | | |
| | Final Hearing & Map Adoption Sept 24 | Map must be posted 7 days prior to adoption. | | | |
| | 2020 | First by-district elections in one council seat (and mayoral seat) | | | |
| | 2021 | Map adjusted using 2020 Census data | | | |
| | 2022 | Remaining three council seats hold first by-district elections | | | |

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
Each of the 4 council districts must have about 17,379 residents.



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Defining Communities of Interest

1st Question: what is your neighborhood or community of interest?

A Community of Interest is generally defined as a neighborhood or community of shared interests, views, problems, or characteristics. Possible community feature/boundary definitions include:

□ School attendance areas

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
- Natural neighborhood dividing lines, such as highway or major roads, rivers, canals, and/or hills
- □ Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks
- Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns
- □ Shared demographic characteristics
 - Such as similar levels of income, education, or linguistic isolation

2nd Question: Does a Community of Interest want to be united in one district, or to be divided to have a voice in multiple elections?



Sample Compact Maps

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


Examples of highly compact maps, with nooks and jogs driven only by equal population requirements.
